Turn down the lights and protect our wildlife

With the clocks going back and the nights drawing in much earlier, many of us instinctively reach for the light switch.

However, for outdoor lights we should think twice, as these have a disastrous effect on our wildlife. Artificial light at night, particularly at dusk or dawn, causes all sorts of problems for wildlife by unnaturally altering their hunting, feeding, mating and other behaviours.

Our LED lights are far brighter than the old orange (sodium) lights, and they tend to emit more blue light which has the greatest negative effects. Our insect populations (on which we all depend for our food security) are plummeting with 40% of species facing extinction, partly due to this excess of light.

But what about security?

This is usually the main reason people turn their outdoor lights on at night. However, whilst bright lights may make us feel safer, they create dark shadows, actually making it easier for potential attackers or intruders to hide. Surprisingly, there is no scientific evidence that increased outdoor lighting deters crime (www.darksky. org/light-pollution/lighting-crime-and-safety).

If you are concerned about security, a motion-sensor light is a much more effective deterrent than one you leave on all evening/night. Set the sensitivity to a level that only activates the light when someone or something enters the area. If you shorten the time they switch on to 30-40 seconds this is sufficient to blind any intruders and still alerts you, whereas having lights on for longer means they can see what they are doing.

Further movements then will trigger the light again making it more obvious there is an intruder and harder for them to see (and stay unseen).

Lights that shine brightly in all directions particularly outwards or upwards are the most harmful to wildlife but there are things we can do to help.

Outdoor lights

Ideally switch all outdoor lights off altogether but if this really isn't possible, try the following:

- For security lights and porch lights, opt for motion-sensor lights as above
- Angle all lights, including security lights and porch lights, so they point directly downwards or towards specific areas, like the door or driveway, rather than letting them shine indiscriminately. Check and adjust light angles regularly
- Even better, fit outdoor lights with a light shield to direct the light downwards and stop it being dispersed upwards and outwards into the night sky. Look for fixtures that are labelled "dark-sky friendly" or designed to minimize light leakage. Consider "cut-off" designs that prevent light from escaping horizontally

- If you already have an outdoor light and can't fit a light shield, replace the bulb with one that has a much lower brightness to reduce light spill while still providing adequate light. Choose lights with a lower lumen rating (around 300-400 lumens for porch lights). You can buy these online or in any hardware store. Remember these are not the same as lower watt bulbs (which just use less energy)
- Many outdoor lights are bluetoned which are harsh and scatter more light. Replace these with a warm colour as this is less intrusive to neighbours and has less impact on wildlife. Choose a colour temperature of 2700K or lower (warm white or amber)
- Use just enough light to illuminate pathways and entryways, and avoid excessive floodlighting. One well-placed light that is not too bright is often enough
- If using Christmas lights outside, avoid decorating trees or hedges and put them around (or just inside) windows or your porch instead

And finally.....

 Spread the word – many people are completely unaware of the damage they are doing by leaving outdoor lights on, so persuade friends and family to switch off too!

Oxhey Bowls Club has always been known as the best kept secret in Oxhey, having been tucked away behind the houses on Watford Heath for over 100 years since its founding in 1910, when it was part of the Grange estate. On discovering the Bowls Club, visitors often comment on how peaceful and serene they find the location.

We are a friendly, outdoor bowls club, with currently a mixed membership of 70 bowlers and 30 social members and are very active in the local bowling circles. Our outdoor season lasts from May to September. We play Watford & District, County matches, and our own internal trophy competitions one of which was presented to the club in 1927 by Ted Ray. He was the professional at the former Pavilion Golf Club which is now part of the Oxhey Hall estate.

Planning news

gs8 development in Oxhey Lane

You may be aware that land on Oxhey Lane (next to the Christmas tree farm) is being proposed for housing development. gs8, the contractor/developer held two community workshops in July and September.

They informed us that the intention of these workshops is to get local residents' feedback on how to shape the development and we understand they are planning a public exhibition

on the plans before the end of the year. They state that their buildings are climate positive with respect to carbon capture, zero waste, water and energy and with a focus on providing affordable homes for first time buyers and young families.

Plans for Chalk Hill

Following an enquiry about the former Massey site on Chalk Hill, OVEG asked local councillors to investigate and have been informed about two separate sites on Chalk Hill that are being sold for potential development. The first is 8-12 Chalk Hill (the Massey site) which has outline planning permission for 224 houses, plus retail and community space with parking for 69 cars. The blocks range from 5-9 storeys high.

The second site is 14-16 and 18 Chalk Hill plus 12 Ye Corner, where there are currently 3 houses. It is being marketed as having potential for similar levels of development, but no planning applications have been submitted to date. It has some Tree Preservation Orders in place and 14 Chalk Hill is a listed building. The two sites are next door to each other.

Heritage Open Day at St Matthew's

"I've walked past this church hundreds of times but never been inside before"

"I got married in this church"

These were just two of the comments from the 50 people who came to visit during our first Heritage Open Day on Friday 5th September.

Having made the decision to take part, we thought about what we could display. We researched the history of the church, which included the original charter granting the land in 1007 (we have a facsimile on the wall in the church), and information on David Carnegie and Thomas Blackwell who (amongst others) gave money towards the building of the church in 1840. A regular attender at the book swap provided us with information about the architect. W. H. Syme, who was responsible for several buildings in Watford. We also put together a display of photographs. Some of these were very old and we had difficulty dating them, and some were of more recent

events in the church. One of our most noteworthy features is a window by the famous stained-glass artist, Karl Parsons, who lived in Kingsfield Road and we reproduced an article from the church magazine of 1916 which explained its symbolism.

Among the many church memorials is one of an Oxhey resident, Flight Sub-Lieutenant R A Warneford, who was awarded the VC and who brought down the first Zeppelin. Unfortunately, he was sadly killed in an air accident shortly afterwards. Warneford Place is named after him. Most of this research was produced as a free booklet which we handed out to visitors.

Most importantly(!) we appealed to the congregation for homemade cakes so we could provide refreshments. Cups of tea and cakes were much appreciated by the people who came and stayed to chat.

It was a very successful and enjoyable day, and we plan to open again next year, probably on both Friday and Saturday.


Oxhey Green uncut

To support our pollinators, it was proposed that some areas of Oxhey Green are left uncut to encourage the growth of wildflowers. You may be wondering why we've asked the council to do this, given that Attenborough's fields are next door to the Green.

However, unfortunately the fields have poor pollinator value, because the grazing of the cows prevents many of the wildflower species we need from flowering. Even if the fields did have lots of wildflowers,

we still need to increase the coverage as much as possible because so much habitat has been lost in the last 70 years.

The UK's gardens provide more space for nature than all the National Nature Reserves put together, but unfortunately an increasing number of domestic gardens also provide little food or habitat for pollinators as so many are now covered in paving, decking or plastic grass. The more we can support them both in our green spaces and our gardens (no matter how small an area), the better.

Oxhey Swapsey

Oxhey Swapsey started as an idea to help residents recycle unwanted but usable household items by donating to others in the local community rather than throwing them away and ending up as landfill. On the first Saturday morning of each month residents were encouraged to put items outside their houses for others to take away.

A key challenge proved to be how people could find out what things were being given away each month, and from where, particularly for anyone not on social media. At our last meeting we explored some possible solutions but all of them involved too much time and capacity, so weren't practical. As there is already a Facebook group (For sale and free in Oxhey Village and nearby), we agreed that we shouldn't duplicate this group.

We are now focusing on how we can make it easier for everyone in the community to recycle things that can't go in the council recycling bins, for example letting others know when planning a dump run to see if they have anything they also need taken, and providing information about the recycling opportunities available in the area for more unusual things such as light bulbs or biros.

"Guerrilla gardening" on Oxhey Green
